Three LEED Awards Given For Rough Rock Community School

The U.S. Green Building Council's Gold Award goes to the high school dorm and the elementary school building. The elementary school dorm receives a Silver Award.

Rough Rock Community School in Arizona, constructed in just two years using American Recovery and Reinvestment Act funds, has received three LEED awards for its new dorms and academic building.

Rough Rock is a K-12 school on two campuses for 417 students, including 188 residential students. On one campus is an elementary school and two dormitories—a K-8 dormitory that houses 86 students and a high school dormitory that houses 102 students—with a kitchen and dining facility. The K-8 dormitory received a LEED Silver Award, the high school dormitory received a LEED Gold Award, and the K-8 academic building received a LEED Gold Award. The awards are from the U.S. Green Building Council and are based on a point system.

The other campus is the renovated high school. A bus garage/maintenance shop and transportation office were constructed. A total of 113,382 square feet were added, while old buildings totaling about 144,000 square feet were demolished.
