Conclusions?

- Bureau school facilities as compared to DoD facilities have improved over the last decade due to both significant construction funding under the Bush Administration and ARRA funding under the Obama Administration.
- However, compared to the number of schools in each system, the current dollar need for major renovation and replacement dollars is about the same for Bureau schools as DoD schools (\$1.3/60 and \$3.7/134).
- And, a major new \$3.7 billion push to bring DoD schools up to adequate or better condition is not occurring at DOI.
- The result is both short and long-term. Indian children, as many military children, are being educated in poor to failing facilities. In the next five years, while military children will obtain education in new facilities as they deserve, if capital allocations remain as the present, Indian children will continue to languish in inadequate facilities.
- This is not acceptable.
