The U.S. Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) has received a proposal for an addendum to one exploratory oil/gas well, access road and related infrastructure on the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation to be located in Section 25, Township 150N, Range 94W. The purpose of the proposed action is to authorize the land use by Zenergy for rerouting of the access road to the Nathan Hale #4-25H well pad. Associated federal actions by BIA include determination of effect regarding cultural resources, approvals of leases, rights-of-way and easements, and a positive recommendation to the Bureau of Land Management regarding the Application for Permit to Drill.

Potential of the proposed actions to impact the human environment is analyzed in the attached addendum to an existing Environmental Assessment (EA), as required by the National Environmental Policy Act. Based on the recently completed addendum to the EA, I have determined that the proposed project will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment. No Environmental Impact Statement is required for any portion of the proposed activities.

This determination is based on the following factors:

- Agency and public involvement was solicited and environmental issues related to the proposal were identified.
- 2. Protective and prudent measures were designed to minimize impacts to air, water, soil, vegetation, wetlands, wildlife, public safety, water resources, and cultural resources. The remaining potential for impacts was disclosed for both the proposed action and the No Action alternative.
- 3. Guidance from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service has been fully considered regarding wildlife impacts, particularly in regard to threatened or endangered species.
- 4. The proposed actions are designed to avoid adverse effects to historic, archaeological, cultural and traditional properties, sites and practices. Compliance with the procedures of the National Historic Preservation Act is complete.
- 5. Environmental justice was fully considered.
- 6. Cumulative effects to the environment are either mitigated or minimal.
- No regulatory requirements have been waived or require compensatory mitigation measures.
- 8. The proposed projects will improve the socio-economic condition of the affected Indian community.

1. Purpose and Need for the Proposed Action

Zenergy is proposing to drill an exploratory oil and gas well on the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation to evaluate and possibly develop the commercial potential of natural resources. The development has been proposed on land held in trust by the United States in McKenzie County, North Dakota. The BIA is the surface management agency for potentially affected tribal lands and individual allotments. The BIA also holds title to subsurface mineral rights. The economic development of available resources and associated BIA actions are consistent with BIA's general mission. Leasing and development of mineral resources offers substantial economic benefits to the Three Affiliated Tribes of the Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara Nation and to individual tribal members.

The purpose of the proposed action is to authorize the land use by Zenergy for rerouting of the access road to the Nathan Hale #4-25H well pad.

2. Authorities

Oil and gas exploration and development activities are conducted under authority of the Indian Mineral Leasing Act of 1938 (25 United States Code [USC] 396a, et seq.), the Indian Mineral Development Act of 1982 (25 USC 2101, et seq.), and the Energy Policy Act of 2005 (42 USC 15801, et seq.).

3. Legal Land Descriptions of Proposed Action:




Figure 1. Project location map at 1:24,000 showing the previously inventoried Nathan Hale #4-25H well pad and access road and the newly inventoried proposed access road reroute (Sandish SW, ND [1970], USGS 7.5' Quadrangle).

The proposed reroute is in the N½ S½ NE¼ of Section 34, the N½ SW¼ NW¼ of Section 34, and the S½ NE¼ of Section 33, Township 150 North, Range 94 West, links the permitted Nathan Hale #4-25H access road, located to the northeast (Ferris 2009), to north/south-trending State Highway 22 to the west (Figure 1).

4. Scope of Work for Proposed Action




Figure 3. Portion of proposed access road reroute along existing upgraded scoria road, facing east from State Highway 22.

Zenergy Operating Company, LLC proposes to reroute the access road. Of the proposed reroute, only the northeast/southwest-trending portion will require access road construction through mechanical excavation, grading, and gravelling (Figures 1 and 2); the western portion along the existing scoria road will not be upgraded (Figure 3).

7. NEPA Adequacy Criteria

This document has identified a previously prepared NEPA document, *Environmental Assessment: Zenergy Dakota-3 Cross #2-13H (January 2008)*, which adequately describes the environmental consequences of the newly proposed action described herein, and meets the following NEPA Adequacy Criteria.

- 1. The proposed action is substantially the same action and at the site specifically analyzed in the existing NEPA document.
- The range of alternatives is reasonable with respect to the current proposed action in the existing NEPA document, which appropriately considers and analyzes current environmental concerns, interests, and resource values.
- 3. The existing analysis and conclusions are adequate in the existing NEPA document. The analysis is still valid in light of new studies or resource assessment information.
- 4. The methodology and analytical approach used in the existing NEPA document continues to be appropriate for the proposed action.
- 5. The direct and indirect impacts of the proposed action are unchanged from those identified in the existing NEPA document.
- 6. The cumulative impacts that would result from implementation of the proposed action are unchanged from those analyzed in the existing NEPA document.
- 7. A 30-day comment period involving public input and interagency review was used in the development of the existing NEPA document.

8. Cultural Resources

A cultural resource inventory of this well pad and access road was conducted by personnel of SWCA Environmental Consultants, using an intensive pedestrian methodology. Approximately 16.43 acres were intensively inventoried on September 21, 2008 (Ferris 2009). No historic properties were located within the project area that appear to possess the quality of integrity and meet at least one of the criteria (36 CFR 60.6) for inclusion on the National Register. As the lead federal agency, and as provided for in 36 CFR 800.5, on the basis of the information provided, BIA reached a determination of **no historic properties** affected for this undertaking. This determination was communicated to the THPO on February 4, 2009; however, the THPO did not respond within the allotted 30-day comment period. The project addition covered in this EA Addendum is adjacent to the area covered by this cultural resource inventory. A cultural resource inventory of this proposed access road reroute was conducted by personnel of SWCA Environmental Consultants. Approximately 10.55 acres were intensively inventoried on July 31, 2009 (Cooper 2009). No historic properties were located within the project area that appear to possess the quality of integrity and meet at least one of the criteria (36 CFR 60.6) for inclusion on the National Register. As the lead federal agency, and as provided for in 36 CFR 800.5, on the basis of the information provided, BIA reached a determination of **no historic properties affected** for this undertaking. This determination was communicated to the THPO on August 25, 2009 and the THPO concurred on September 9,2009

Dear Mr. Brady:

We have considered the potential effects on cultural resources of an oil well pad access road reroute in McKenzie County, North Dakota. Approximately 10.55 acres were intensively inventoried using a pedestrian methodology. Potential surface disturbances are not expected to exceed the area depicted in the enclosed report. No historic properties were located that appear to possess the quality of integrity and meet at least one of the criteria (36 CFR 60.4) for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places. No properties were located that appear to qualify for protection under the American Indian Religious Freedom Act (16 USC 1996).

As the surface management agency, and as provided for in 36 CFR 800.5, we have therefore reached a determination of no historic properties affected for this undertaking. Catalogued as BIA Case Number AAO-1602/FB/09, the proposed undertaking, location, and project dimensions are described in the following report:
