Addendum to Environmental Assessment to Authorize an Additional Well on the Mandaree 07-17H Well Pad (July 2011)

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1. Purpose and Need for the Proposed Action

EOG Resources, Inc. (EOG) is proposing to drill a Middle Bakken Formation oil and gas well on the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation to evaluate and possibly develop the commercial potential of natural resources. Developments have been proposed on land held in trust by the United States in McKenzie County, North Dakota. The Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) is the surface management agency for potentially affected tribal lands and individual allotments. The BIA also holds title to subsurface mineral rights. The economic development of available resources and associated BIA actions are consistent with BIA's general mission. Leasing and development of mineral resources offers substantial economic benefits to the Three Affiliated Tribes of the Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara Nation and to individual tribal members.

The purpose of the proposed action is to authorize EOG to drill a second well (Mandaree 109-17H) to explore the potential of the Middle Bakken Formation, on the approved Mandaree 07-17H well pad.

2. Authorities

Oil and gas exploration and development activities are conducted under authority of the Indian Mineral Leasing Act of 1938 (25 United States Code [USC] 396a, et seq.), the Indian Mineral Development Act of 1982 (25 USC 2101, et seq.), and the Energy Policy Act of 2005 (42 USC 15801, et seq.).

3. Legal Land Description for Proposed Action




Figure 1. Map of the Mandaree 07-17H and Mandaree 109-17H Location.

The well pad is located 3.8 miles west of Mandaree, North Dakota, in the NW¼ NW¼ of Section 17, Township 149 North, Range 94 West, McKenzie County, North Dakota (Figure 1). The proposed Mandaree 109-17H well will have a bottom hole located approximately 4,765 feet south and 1,496 feet east of the surface location, in the SE¼ SW¼ of Section 17, Township 149 North, Range 94 West, McKenzie County.

4. Scope of Work for Proposed Action

EOG proposes to drill a second well, which will enter the Middle Bakken Formation, on the approved Mandaree 07-17H well pad. There will be no additional surface disturbance to the existing well pad or access road.

5. Resource Surveys

SWCA Environmental Consultants (SWCA) conducted a cultural resource inventory of this well pad and associated access road using an intensive pedestrian methodology Approximately 10.6 acres were inventoried for the well pad on September 27, 2009 (Higgins 2009¹). No historic properties were located that appear to possess the quality of integrity and

meet at least one of the criteria (Title 36 Code of Federal Regulations 60.6) for inclusion on the National Register.

SWCA conducted natural resource surveys for threatened and endangered species, migratory birds, bald and golden eagles, and wetlands on September 27, 2009. Representatives from the BIA and Bureau of Land Management were present during these site visits. No protected species were observed during the survey.

6. Applicable National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Document(s)

Environmental Assessment: EOG Resources, Inc. Proposed Five Exploratory Wells: Mandaree 09-04H, Mandaree 11-06H, Mandaree 03-08H, Mandaree 01-10H, Mandaree 07-17H (December 2009).

7. NEPA Adequacy Criteria

This document has identified the above-mentioned previously prepared NEPA document, which adequately describes the environmental consequences of the newly proposed action described herein, and meets the following NEPA Adequacy Criteria.

- 1. The proposed action is substantially the same action and at the site specifically analyzed in the existing NEPA document.
- 2. The range of alternatives is reasonable with respect to the current proposed action in the existing NEPA document, which appropriately considers and analyzes current environmental concerns, interests, and resource values.
- 3. The existing analysis and conclusions are adequate in the existing NEPA document. The analysis is still valid in light of new studies or resource assessment information.
- 4. The methodology and analytical approach used in the existing NEPA document continues to be appropriate for the proposed action.
- 5. The direct and indirect impacts of the proposed action are unchanged from those identified in the existing NEPA document.
- 6. The cumulative impacts that would result from implementation of the proposed action are unchanged from those analyzed in the existing NEPA document.
- 7. A 30-day comment period involving public input and interagency review was used in the development of the existing NEPA document.
