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1. Purpose and Need for the Proposed Action

Dakota-3 E&P Company, LLC (Dakota-3) is proposing to drill exploratory Middle Bakken Formation oil wells on the Fort Berthold Indian Reservation to evaluate and possibly develop the commercial potential of natural resources. Developments have been proposed on land held in trust by the United States in Dunn County, North Dakota. The Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) is the surface management agency for potentially affected tribal lands and individual allotments. The BIA also holds title to subsurface mineral rights. The economic development of available resources and associated BIA actions are consistent with BIA's general mission. Leasing and development of mineral resources offers substantial economic benefits to the Three Affiliated Tribes of the Mandan, Hidatsa, and Arikara Nation and to individual tribal members.

This action would qualify under the BIA regulations as a categorical exclusion. Information in this addendum is provided to document analysis of impacts leading to this designation. See accompanying CATEX form. The purpose of the proposed action is to authorize Dakota-3 to drill two additional wells to explore the potential of the Middle Bakken Formation, on the approved Fast Dog #16-6H well pad.

2. Authorities

Oil and gas exploration and development activities are conducted under authority of the Indian Mineral Leasing Act of 1938 (25 United States Code [USC] 396a, et seq.), the Indian Mineral Development Act of 1982 (25 USC 2101, et seq.), and the Energy Policy Act of 2005 (42 USC 15801, et seq.).

3. Legal Land Description for Proposed Action




Figure 1. Map of the Fast Dog #16-6H Well Pad Location.

The Fast Dog #16-6H well pad is located approximately 7.5 miles south of Mandaree, North Dakota, in the SE¼ SE¼ of Section 6, Township 148 North, Range 94 West, Dunn County, North Dakota (Figure 1). The proposed two Fast Dog #16-6H wells will have bottom holes located approximately:

- Fast Dog #6-7D: 5,329 feet south and 300 feet west of the surface location, in the SE¼ SE¼ of Section 7, Township 148 North, Range 94 West, Dunn County (Figure 1).
- Fast Dog #6HD: 4,364 feet north and 347 feet west of the surface location, in the NE¼ NE¼ of Section 6, Township 148 North, Range 94 West, Dunn County (Figure 1).

4. Scope of Work for Proposed Action

Dakota-3 proposes to drill two additional wells, which will enter the Middle Bakken Formation, on the approved Fast Dog #16-6H well pad. There will be no additional surface disturbance to the well pad or access road.

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5. Cultural Resources

The cultural resource inventory of this well pad and associated access road was conducted by personnel of SWCA Environmental Consultants (SWCA), using an intensive pedestrian methodology. Approximately 20.2 acres were inventoried on July 08, 2010, for the well pad and access road (Smith 2011¹). No historic properties were located that appear to possess the quality of integrity and meet at least one of the criteria (Title 36 Code of Federal Regulations 60.6) for inclusion on the National Register.

6. Applicable National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Document(s)

Environmental Assessment: Dakota-3 E&P Company, LLC: Three Bakken Exploratory Wells; Dakota-3 Blue Buttes #3-21H, Dakota-3 Delores Sand #29-32H, Dakota-3 Fast Dog #16-6H (June 2011).

8. NEPA Adequacy Criteria

This document has identified the above-mentioned previously prepared NEPA document, which adequately describes the environmental consequences of the newly proposed action described herein, and meets the following NEPA Adequacy Criteria.

- 1. The proposed action is substantially the same action and at the site specifically analyzed in the existing NEPA document.
- 2. The range of alternatives is reasonable with respect to the current proposed action in the existing NEPA document, which appropriately considers and analyzes current environmental concerns, interests, and resource values.
- 3. The existing analysis and conclusions are adequate in the existing NEPA document. The analysis is still valid in light of new studies or resource assessment information.
- 4. The methodology and analytical approach used in the existing NEPA document continues to be appropriate for the proposed action.
- 5. The direct and indirect impacts of the proposed action are unchanged from those identified in the existing NEPA document.
- 6. The cumulative impacts that would result from implementation of the proposed action are unchanged from those analyzed in the existing NEPA document.
- 7. A 30-day comment period involving public input and interagency review was used in the development of the existing NEPA document.


