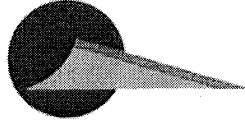

To the members of the Osage Minerals Council, Osage Tribal Council and Mr. Eddie Streator, DFO:

Ceja Corporation and the founding Oliphant family have been partners to the Osage Nation for over 80 years. It has always been our policy to support and respect the decisions made by the Osage with regards to the management of their own mineral estate and we have rarely voiced our thoughts and opinions in regards to these matters. However, after reviewing the current proposed changes to the Code of Federal Regulations for Osage County, we believe we must express our strong opinion that these changes will discourage oil and gas exploration in Osage County and be extremely harmful to the Osage Nation.

We have always viewed our relationship with the Osage as mutually beneficial and have taken the stated position that doing business here is a positive situation. Without enumerating our specific objections, we feel that the proposed changes to the CFR, as currently presented, alter this relationship and represent positions that are extremely operator unfriendly and even punitive. These rules enforced as proposed will be especially detrimental to the continuing operations of the smaller operators in the County. The costs incurred by the implementation of these changes will serve to shorten the economic life of the existing production base and will likely diminish the ultimate royalties paid to the Headright owners within the Tribe. In addition, some of these changes appear to be drafted to make it easier to condemn and confiscate certain types of properties.

Although some change may be necessary to bring the code to a more current status, if enacted in the drafted form, these regulations will ultimately prove to be harmful to the future business environment in the Osage Nation. We strongly urge you to reconsider the overall impact of these changes, not only as they affect your business partners, the operators, but also as they could potentially harm Tribal revenues.
