What is the purpose of this consultation?

To receive Tribal input on the draft FY25 Tribal Grant Directed Announcement for the Abandoned Hardrock Mine Reclamation Program (AHMR)

What is the Abandoned Hardrock Mine Reclamation (AHMR) Program?

- Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)
 - PL 117-58; November 15, 2021
- Title VII Abandoned Mine Land Reclamation
 - Section 40704: Abandoned Hardrock Mine Reclamation
 - \$3 billion authorized; \$0 appropriated
 - ~\$5 million annually since FY22
 - 1. Federal Program OEPC
 - BLM, NPS, USFWS, USDA/FS
 - \$4.86 million (FY22-FY24)
 - 2. State Grant Program OEPC/IBC
 - \$3.5 million for State and private lands, 19 projects
 - 3. Tribal Grant Program OEPC/IBC
 - ~\$1.4 million available







Benefits of properly closing hardrock abandoned mines:

- Over 700,000 AML features nationwide
- 85% are hardrock mine features
- Remove health & safety hazards
- Cleanup soils, surface water & groundwater contamination
- Restore habitat
- Reopen public spaces
- Create jobs and economic opportunities for communities

Definitions – Hardrock Abandoned Mine

- Affecting lands and water resources on
 - Federal, State, Tribal, local & private
- Containing
 - One or more sites or features
- Resulting from:
 - Past exploration, development, mining, or processing of any solid minerals excluding coal & associated facilities
- Sites and features may include:
 - Disturbances resulting from prospecting for, or extraction of minerals (i.e., stockpiles, processing locations, shafts, adits, open pits or prospect pits / trenches, waste rock piles, and tailings piles)
 - Roads
 - Other areas of disturbance (i.e., highwalls)
 - Associated structures and equipment incidental to mining, mineral extraction, or mineral exploration activities (i.e., buildings, headframes, tools)

Use of Funds

Eligible activities include:

- Inventory
- Assessment of site conditions
- Addressing physical safety
- Decommissioning / Reclamation
- Responding to hazardous substances releases
- Remediation in accordance with the Tribal equivalent of CERCLA

Tribal AHMR Program

Grant Options:

- (1) Inventory Grant Only \$50,000 max
- (2) Project Grant Only \$200,000 max
- (3) Combination Grant (inventory + project)\$250,000 max(\$50,000 inventory + up to \$200,000 projects)

Evaluation Criteria

How will proposals be evaluated?

- A panel will review the applications to evaluate the criteria addressed
- Merit Review Criteria from the grant announcement:
 - 1. Physical Safety Risks
 - 2. Accessibility
 - 3. Mitigation of Environmental Harm
 - 4. Contaminant Risks
 - 5. Water Resources Improvements
 - 6. Land Management Use Priorities

How to Apply

FY25 Grant Application Process

- Final Guidance ~ Fall 2025
- Applications Due 90 days
- Applications to be submitted electronically to GrantSolutions
- Interior Business Center (IBC) will pull grant applications from GrantSolutions

Specific Questions from the DTLL

- 1. Is your Tribe interested in applying for an AHMR grant this funding cycle? If yes, what type? (Inventory only, Project only, or a combination of Inventory and Project grants)?
- 2. If known, what types of hardrock (non-coal) abandoned mines (gold, silver, gravel, uranium, etc.) and feature types (shafts, adits, pits, etc.) are located on your Tribal lands?
- 3. Does your Tribe have an abandoned hardrock mine inventory either in-progress or complete? (If yes, please explain where it is housed, how you collected the data, and estimated percentage complete.)
- 4. Do you have, or has you ever had, an abandoned hardrock mine program? (If yes, please explain.)

Specific Questions from the DTLL

- 5. Do you have the capacity to perform data collection activities, reclamation or remediation work on abandoned hardrock mines? (If yes, please explain. If no, please describe what your Tribe would need to complete the work, such as increased staff, GPS units, vehicles, etc.)
- 6. Please provide the contact information for the Tribal member either currently serving in an abandoned hardrock mine director role or who would assume that role on behalf of the Tribe and likely apply for the grant. (Please provide a name, title if applicable, email, and phone number.)
- 7. Do you have any other comments or suggestions regarding the AHMR Tribal Grants?
