1 PROCEEDINGS 2 (2:04 p.m.) MR. WHALEY: Hello, everyone. Welcome 3 to the consultation. I'm just going to give 4 5 everybody a second to get joined in and have their audio connected. We appreciate your patience. 6 7 Okay. It looks like we've got everybody 8 in. You've all been placed into the consultation. 9 Please ensure that your mic remains on mute until 10 the specified time for comments. 11 And if you could also just take a moment 12 to add your title and affiliation to your name and 13 Zoom. You can do this by clicking on the participant list. Just find your name, click on 14 15 the blue "more" next to your name, and choose 16 "rename." 17 As a reminder, this is a 18 government-to-government consultation. 19 Consequently, this consultation is closed to the 20 press. So, if you are a member of the press, we 21 do ask that you disconnect at this time. 22 Additionally, this session is being recorded, and

1 transcripts will be created. So, if you do not 2 consent to being recorded, we also ask that you 3 disconnect at this time.

4 We have closed-captioning services 5 today. If you need those, to access closed captioning, click on the up arrow next to the 6 7 closed-caption box at the bottom of your screen 8 and choose subtitle. And if you have issues with 9 that, you can also follow the link that I will put 10 into the chat message. I will also put a link to 11 the Dear Tribal Leader letter and the consultation 12 web page in the chat session as well.

13 When we get to the comment portion of today's session, we welcome your comments. If you 14 15 would like to make a verbal comment, please raise your virtual hand by going down to the reactions 16 17 button at the bottom of your screen. Select raise 18 hand, and we will call on individuals to speak. 19 If you're unable to raise your virtual hand, 20 please type your comment in the chat box. And 21 when you are called upon to provide a comment, 22 please provide your name, title, and Tribe.

1 And with that, I'm going to turn the 2 time over to Kate Kelly, who is the deputy chief of staff for Policy for Secretary Haaland and the 3 Department of Interior. She is here with us today 4 5 because Assistant Secretary Bryan Newland is on the road to healing, BIA initiative with the 6 7 Secretary in Arizona. So, we appreciate her being 8 here today. Thank you. 9 MS. KELLY: Great. Thank you, Oliver. Appreciate that introduction. And thank you, 10 11 everybody, for joining. Welcome to this 12 consultation on the list of programs eligible for 13 inclusion in funding agreements negotiated with Self- Governance Tribes by interiors bureaus other 14 than Bureau of Indian Affairs. This list is 15 16 prepared annually pursuant to Section 412(c) of 17 the Indian Self-Determination and Education 18 Assistance Act, or ISDEAA. 19 As Oliver said, my name is Kate Kelly. I am the deputy chief of staff for policy at the 20 21 Interior Department. I am honored to work for

Secretary Haaland and work closely with Bryan

Newland, the assistant secretary of Indian
 Affairs.

Before we get started, I want to make 3 sure that we start this consultation off on the 4 5 right foot by calling for a blessing. We do not have someone selected to offer a prayer, so we 6 7 will take a moment of silence for everyone to find 8 their own way to give thanks and set intentions 9 for this consultation. So, please join me in a brief moment of silence. 10

11 Thank you. So, now, we'll begin the 12 consultation. And I want to start by introducing 13 the other federal officials that are joining 14 today. You've heard from Oliver, but I would also 15 like to introduce Rose, if you could introduce 16 yourself.

MS. PETOSKEY: Hello. Thanks, Kate.
Good afternoon, everyone. My name is Rose
Petosky, and I serve as senior counselor to
assistant secretary of Indian Affairs, Bryan
Newland. Thank you all for joining us today, and
I will pass it over to Sharee.

1 MS. FREEMAN: Good morning for some, 2 good afternoon for others. Always a pleasure to 3 be with you. My name is Sharee Freeman. I'm the director of the Office of Self- Governance in the 4 5 Department of Interior. And I'm normally the person who works to get this non-BIA list out, 6 7 working with the other non-BIA bureaus every year. 8 MS. KELLY: Thank you, Sharee. All 9 right. I think, with that, we are ready to get 10 into the consultation. We will start with a brief 11 presentation, a PowerPoint, just to ensure that 12 folks have shared background and a sense of the 13 questions upon which we are consulting on. And then we have two hours set aside to hear from you 14 15 all on this topic. So, I think Oliver is going to 16 pull up a short PowerPoint, and we will begin. 17 Thank you, Oliver. So, today's topic 18 for consultation is, again, the list of programs 19 eligible for inclusion in funding agreements 20 negotiated for self-governance Tribes other than 21 BIA bureaus. And this is prepared, as Sharee 22 said, annually, pursuant to ISDEAA. Next slide,

1 please.

2 Prior versions of this annual list have 3 included non-BIA programs or portions of programs that are eligible for inclusion in self-governance 4 5 funding agreements with Tribes. Past lists have also included fiscal year programmatic targets for 6 non-BIA bureaus under Title IV of ISDEAA. This 7 8 list is not a definitive list of all potentially 9 contractable programs, and there may be many more 10 that have yet to be identified. Next slide, 11 please.

12 Part of our motivation for this 13 consultation and this work to re-examine the annual list is motivated by Secretarial Order 14 15 3403, which directs interiors bureaus to enter 16 into co-stewardship agreements with Indian Tribes 17 on the management of lands and waters under the 18 department's jurisdiction. This is a joint 19 secretarial order entered into by Departments of Interior and USDA, and we are now on our second 20 21 year of implementation to advance co-stewardship 22 in a meaningful way across the department. And

1 the department views ISDEAA as a really critical 2 and important means for fulfilling the goals of that secretarial order, that the list is a 3 4 valuable resource for Tribes who are seeking to 5 develop those arrangements and formal agreements on co-stewardship with federal lands and waters. 6 7 Next slide, please. 8 In August, Interior Department 9 leadership participated in a listening session on 10 this topic at the Self- Governance Conference. It 11 was well attended, and non-BIA program staff were 12 available to answer questions-and-answers. Given 13 the interest and the complexity of the issues it indicated, we determined that additional 14 15 consultation would be valuable on this topic and 16 the content of the list. And so, this is the last of the consultation sessions on this topic. And 17 18 we, again, are appreciative of you joining. Next 19 slide. 20 There are three main topics that we are

21 hoping to hear from you all on related to the 22 annual list. First would be the value of the

1 current format of the list for Indian Tribes 2 seeking contracting, self-governance agreements, 3 or compacting under ISDEAA. Second is whether adding to the list of all contracts -- sorry, 4 adding to the list -- a list of all contracts, 5 self-governance agreements and/or compacts entered 6 7 into by department bureaus other than BIA would be 8 helpful for Tribes seeking to contract or compact. 9 And third, we are seeking general guidance on the principles governing contracting 10 11 self-governance agreements or compacting under 12 ISDEAA, and whether they should be included in the 13 list when it's published. I believe that's the 14 last slide, Oliver. 15 Oh, no. Importantly, information on how you can continue to provide feedback on 16 17 consultation closes -- those written comments are due in approximately a month, February 20th. And 18 19 so, that is the email address, and we can drop it 20 in the chat as well where you can provide feedback. And if you have any questions, Sam 21 22 Kohn, in our Office of the Assistant Secretary of

Indian Affairs, his email address is listed there
 as well.

All right. I believe we are at the best 3 4 part of the consultation where I stop presenting 5 and talking and get to the listening part. And so, Oliver, I don't know if you want to remind 6 7 people how to offer questions, comments, and 8 feedback, but I believe you're able to raise your 9 hand or to drop feedback in the chat. So, Oliver, 10 let me know if I dropped -- missed anything. 11 Otherwise, we'll start the listening.

12 MR. WHALEY: Yes. So, if you are on the Zoom call, again, you can raise your virtual hand 13 by going to the reactions page, select raise hand. 14 15 If you're joining us via a toll-free number, please hit star 9 to raise your hand and star 6 to 16 mute and unmute yourself. And then, of course, if 17 none of those options work or are available for 18 19 you, you can put your question or comment in the 20 chat, and those will be captured as well. And 21 then we'll try to -- if there are any questions in 22 the chat, we'll try to get to those as well.

1 MS. KELLY: Thank you, Oliver. I 2 appreciate everybody's time is incredibly valuable. And as Tribal Leaders, I appreciate you 3 making the time to join us for this consultation. 4 5 I want to make sure that if anybody has a comment to make, that we certainly provide the time and 6 7 space for that to happen. So, we'll continue to 8 _ _ 9 MS. SAMPSON: I got my hand up. 10 MS. KELLY: Sandra. There we go. Is 11 that you? 12 MS. SAMPSON: Yeah. 13 MS. KELLY: All right. I hear you. MS. SAMPSON: Thank you. Sandy Sampson, 14 15 I am the treasurer for the Confederated Tribes of 16 the Umatilla Indian Reservation. And you had 17 talked about some non-BIA programs and a listing 18 that could help or enhance, maybe identify 19 different programmatic type of self-governance, 20 compacting, contracting, whatever a Tribe would 21 want to do. Where would I find that list? And --22 because I remember just seeing something on the --

1 on some of the scenic byways in our seated area. 2 So, they received funding, but where would I find 3 that information out and to move forward? I know 4 we still have until February 20th to provide more 5 feedback, but I guess just trying to understand 6 your presentation and those programmatic targets 7 on how to identify those. Thank you.

8 MS. KELLY: Yeah, thank you. That's a 9 great question, Sandy. And I will respond by saying -- so this list is published annually in 10 11 the Federal Registry Notice. And so, I think Rose 12 is working to drop that list, the most recent list, in the chat here, so you are able to review 13 it and have a sense of what we are talking about. 14 15 I think you'll note that the list is often divided by the non-BIA bureaus such as Fish and Wildlife 16 17 Service, National Park Service, and BLM, and identifies the functions by which these bureaus 18 19 may approach these self-governance agreements, or 20 sometimes, they are identified by, like, specific land management units. So, it's worth taking a 21 22 look. And that should be available for all of you

1 now in the chat. Thank you, Rose, for doing that. 2 MS. SAMPSON: Yeah. I know we do some 3 BIA realty- type compacts, but I'm just considering other type -- BLM and other type of 4 5 different scenarios that may be available to Tribes, you know, whether it's co-managing, 6 7 co-stewardship, you know, that type of thing. So, 8 thank you. 9 MS. KELLY: Yes, thank you. And I think we are in a similar place of wanting to know the 10 11 real possibilities here when it comes to 12 self-governance contracts with non-BIA bureaus. 13 So, appreciate your comment there. 14 In case it's useful for me to repeat the 15 main questions for consultation, I'll do so. And 16 if that inspires -- Oh, I see -- Curtis, are you 17 coming on to offer a comment? 18 MR. VANDERMOLEN: I do have a comment or 19 a question, but I --20 MS. KELLY: Okay. 21 MR. VANDERMOLEN: Please, you know, 22 finish your recital, and maybe it will prompt

1 others after me.

2 MS. KELLY: Sure. Okay. The three 3 areas of inquiry identified in the consultation notice are related to, first, the value of the 4 5 current format of the list. The second is whether adding to the list -- a list of all contracts, 6 7 agreements, or compacts would be helpful for other 8 Tribes to have access to. And third is whether 9 developing guidance on the principles governing 10 contract should be included in the list when it is 11 published. Thank you for pulling that up there. 12 All right. Over to you, Curtis. 13 MR. VANDERMOLEN: Thank you. My name is Curtis Vandermolen, and I work for the firm 14 15 Peebles Kidder. And we represent Tribal clients 16 and Tribal governments. We have a number of 17 clients that are interested in 477 compacts in 18 particular. And I understand this is under 19 ISDEAA, which is somewhat a different program. 20 But it would be really helpful, I think, if, in 21 the list, you can kind of cross-reference or

22 identify which of those are eligible for 638

1 contracting and which are eligible for the 477 2 block grant. 3 MS. KELLY: Thank you. I appreciate 4 that comment. 5 MS. PETOSKEY: I might just add here in response to Curtis' comment. Sorry, I turned off 6 7 my camera. The sun is blinding me right now, but 8 _ _ MS. KELLY: Oh, yes. Please go in --9 please jump in, Rose. 10 11 MS. PETOSKEY: I just wanted to say I --12 so, Sam Cohn, who couldn't be here, is sort of our 13 477 expert from the Asia office. And I just wanted to add that one of the things we are 14 15 thinking about, certainly with expanding the list, 16 is how we can incorporate 477 or model 477 with 17 ISDEAA because 477 is just -- it's a great model, 18 and definitely something that we're thinking about 19 too, Curtis. So, I just wanted to add that. MS. KELLY: Thank you, Rose. Other 20 comments or questions? Great. I'll pause for a 21 22 few more minutes to make sure that if there are

1 any thoughts that are formulating or questions 2 that you may have, I want to make the most of your 3 time. And I think consultation is one of the most 4 important things we do. So, definitely don't want 5 to cut short any comments or questions while we 6 have the time.

7 All right. I'll offer, again, just a 8 reminder of the questions we're seeking feedback 9 on. And also note that if you would prefer to 10 offer comments via -- in writing, that those are 11 welcomed by February 20th at the email that is in 12 the chat box. But if you would like to offer a 13 comment on this consultation, we are seeking feedback on the value of the current list and its 14 15 format to Tribes, you know, whether adding a list 16 of all contracts, agreements or compacts would be helpful for Tribes, and then whether general 17 guidance on the principles governing contracting 18 19 agreements or compacting should be included in 20 publication of the annual list. So, I'll just give it maybe one or two more minutes and make 21 22 sure that we provided opportunity to gather your

1 thoughts and feedback.

2 All right. Well, I want to thank everybody who has joined us today and thank 3 everybody who offered comments and questions. I 4 5 really appreciate your time. I know you're all 6 incredibly busy and important people, and have 7 many things to do on a Friday afternoon. So, 8 appreciate your time. 9 Again, please don't hesitate to offer 10 written comments by February 20th. And based on 11 the questions and the comments that we receive 12 through this consultation and in writing, we

13 anticipate making -- being able to perfect and 14 make changes to the annual list that is published 15 through ISDEAA. Rose, Sharee, is there anything 16 else you'd like to add at this point?

MS. FREEMAN: I don't have anythingelse.

MS. PETOSKEY: Yeah, they're just -thank you, everybody, for joining and we look
forward to reviewing written comments on the 20th.
