3	MS. BROWN: Hello, well, we'll give					
4	people a few minutes, just one minute to let audio					
5	join. And then we'll get started. I'd like to					
6	welcome you all to this consultation on draft					
7	updates to the ANC Consultation Policy and					
8	Procedures through the Department of Interior.					
9	Just a few housekeeping notes before we get					
10	started. I would like to invite you to put your					
11	name and your organization in the box for your					
12	Zoom. And to help with audio quality, please mute					
13	your cameras or please mute yourself and turn					
14	off cameras until the discussion begins. Closed					
15	captioning will be available for this session and					
16	I will put that link in the chat. This is a					
17	consultation that is closed to the press. So, if					
18	you're a member of the press, we ask that you					
19	disconnect at this time. The session will be					
20	recorded. So, if you do not consent to our					
21	recording, you may disconnect at this time as					
22	well. I will now turn it over to Principal Deputy

- 2 "Little Elk" Garrett. Please go ahead. Thank
- 3 you.
- 4 MR. GARRETT: Hi, and welcome. Before
- 5 we get into today's consultation, as is our way in
- 6 Indian Country, we wanted to provide a moment for
- 7 people to pray or have a moment of reflection,
- 8 whatever your way is to gather yourself and center
- 9 yourself, but we'll take a moment right now.
- 10 (Moment of Silence)
- MR. GARRETT: Thank you everybody. So,
- 12 thank you for joining today's consultation on the
- draft of the Department of Interior Alaska Native
- 14 Corporation Consultation Policy and Procedures.
- These will be new chapters in the departmental
- 16 manual. And -- hold on one sec -- they will be
- 17 new chapters in the departmental manual part 112,
- 18 chapter six of the policy, and the departmental
- manual part 512, chapter seven, for the procedures
- on consultation. These new chapters are part of
- 21 an effort to update the department's consultation
- 22 policies, as well as incorporate the free standing

- 1 2012 Department of Interior Policy on consultation
- with ANSCA Corporations into the new departmental
- 3 manual. We have undertaken a similar update with
- 4 our consultation policy with federally recognized
- 5 Tribes. And we are doing the same with ANSCA
- 6 Corporations and also with the Native Hawaiian
- 7 Community.
- 8 On August 15th, we sent a consultation
- 9 invitation letter that included the draft DM
- 10 chapters and a copy of the 2012 policy. The
- 11 chapters seek to do the following: one, outline
- 12 the requirements for consultation between Alaska
- 13 Native Claims Settlement Act Corporation officials
- and Department of Interior officials. Two, to
- 15 clarify the department or manual chapters that
- 16 apply to all departmental bureaus and offices.
- 17 Three, identify the responsibilities of the
- department bureaus and offices in the consultation
- 19 process. And also, finally, to establish an ANSCA
- 20 Corporation Consultation Policy annual report for
- 21 departments and departmental bureaus and offices.
- 22 The Department of Interior -- we want to take an

- 1 opportunity to open a new chapter in our
- 2 consultation where this is meaningful, and it
- 3 becomes second nature in the federal
- 4 decision-making process. As many know, Executive
- 5 Order 13175, you know, it requires us, you know,
- 6 straight from the President to really lean in and
- 7 move up to Tribal consultation. And this is
- 8 something that we take very serious. And, you
- 9 know, part of that is making sure that we're
- 10 reaching all of Indian Country in appropriate
- 11 ways. And part of that is -- and that's why we're
- 12 undertaking this effort to have this ANSCA
- 13 Corporation Consultation Policy.
- 14 So, we look forward to hearing from you
- 15 today, and what you have to say. And we hope
- 16 that, you know, today is not the end of a
- 17 conversation. But you know, really, one step on
- an ongoing journey of continued and fruitful
- 19 dialogue. And, you know, just evolving our
- 20 relationships with everybody. So now, I'm going
- 21 to turn the coordination activities over to
- 22 Joaquin Gallegos, who's a special assistant in our

- office, and has been taking a leadership role,
- 2 along with Tracy Goodluck from our office. I also
- 3 just want to thank you all for participating. And
- 4 then also, to thank the rest of our staff,
- 5 including Rachel and others for setting this up.
- 6 It's a lot of work and a lot of coordinating of
- 7 schedules. So, we're thankful to them, and I'll
- 8 turn the floor over to Joaquin.
- 9 MR. GALLEGOS: Thank you, Principal
- 10 Deputy Assistant Secretary. We look forward to
- 11 hearing what you all have to say today. And at
- this time, we'll turn the floor over to hear
- 13 comments from Alaska Native Corporation, CEOs, or
- 14 leaders. And then perhaps open the conversation
- up to others who may wish to speak. If you can,
- 16 please use the raise hand function. And we will
- 17 get to you in the order that you raise your hand.
- 18 So, the floor is yours.
- 19 While we wait for folks to gather their
- 20 thoughts, we note that after receiving your input,
- 21 the department will incorporate the policy into
- the department manual at part 512, chapter six,

- and consultation procedures at chapter seven. You
- 2 can also provide written input and we'll put that
- 3 in the chat. Elizabeth Hensley?
- 4 MS. HENSLEY: Yes. Hi. Good morning.
- 5 Good afternoon. I was able to make comments
- 6 yesterday, and really appreciated that opportunity
- 7 in my role here at NANA Regional Corporation. But
- 8 I just wanted to say hello and longtime no see,
- 9 Wizi. It's really wonderful to see you in this
- 10 role. Congratulations. I know that you're really
- 11 familiar with Alaska. And it's really wonderful
- that you're there. And I already got to see other
- folks yesterday, but just wanted to say hey, and
- 14 thanks for hosting another day here.
- MR. GARRETT: Great to see you. We were
- 16 together at DOI, and we were in law school
- 17 together. Awesome to see people.
- MS. BROWN: If you would like to make a
- 19 comment, you can use the reaction button and the
- 20 bottom of your screen to raise your hand. If
- 21 you're joining by phone, please hit star nine to
- raise your virtual hand, and star six to unmute.

- 1 MR. GALLEGOS: Thanks, Liz. And then,
- Jaeleen?
- 3 MS. KOOKESH: Yes, thank you. My name
- 4 is Jaeleen Kookesh. I'm Vice President for Policy
- 5 and Legal Affairs with Sealaska Corporation. I'm
- 6 Tlingit and Koyukan Athabaskan, originally from
- 7 Angoon, Alaska, and Southeast Alaska. I did spend
- 8 10 years in Washington D.C. many years ago. But
- 9 happy to be back in Alaska working for Alaska
- 10 Native people. I appreciate the opportunity to
- 11 hear from all of you, and to provide some
- 12 consultation. As I said, I work with Sealaska
- Corporation in the southeast, and have been pretty
- 14 heavily involved in ensuring the ANCs have similar
- 15 consultation opportunities that our Tribal
- 16 governments have. Especially in Alaska, because
- our land base is owned by Alaska Native
- 18 corporations. So, do appreciate the opportunity
- 19 to strengthen the consultation processes within
- 20 every department and within DOI. Our critical ask
- 21 has always been to ensure that we have meaningful
- 22 consultation opportunities throughout the entire

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1 federal process of taking action from beginning to
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- 2 end. We don't want to have the opportunity to
- 3 consult after the agency's already heavily
- 4 ingrained or trenched in their decision in their
- 5 process that they're going to take.
- So, we do want to just make sure that
- 7 there is opportunities throughout the process.
- 8 And at some point, I would hope to hear thoughts
- 9 from the department on efforts that Congressman
- 10 Grijalva is making around the Respect Act. It's
- 11 very detailed process for consultation, and I
- 12 wanted to get your feedback on whether or not that
- fits within the process that you're defining here.
- 14 Also, just want to ensure that even though we are
- 15 Alaska Native Corporations and speak on issues
- 16 that affect our Alaska Native Corporation
- shareholders in our lands, and assets and
- opportunities, there are many times that we work
- 19 closely with our Tribes to ensure that their
- 20 interests are represented and still hope to have
- 21 an opportunity to provide support for our Tribes
- on impacts to our Tribes and our Tribal

- 1 governments as well. We do want to be able to
- 2 support those processes.
- 3 So, I hope it's not a hard line between
- 4 Tribal consultation and ANSCA consultation in
- 5 Alaska, because many things affect all of our
- 6 Alaska Native people, regardless of which
- 7 organization that we sit at. But, I do appreciate
- 8 the opportunity to provide some comments and happy
- 9 to have any follow up discussions with any of you
- 10 at the Interior Department. And we'll be
- 11 submitting written comments. But thank you.
- 12 (Speaks in Native Language.)
- MR. GALLEGOS: Thank you so much for
- 14 that feedback, Jaeleen. And I wrote down all of
- your comments, and generally regarding Respect
- 16 Act, the department has no comment unless asked
- 17 upon by Congress, but we have looked at it. So,
- 18 thank you. Are there any other comments or
- 19 questions at this time? And as background,
- 20 consultations with Indian Tribes and Alaska Native
- 21 Villages happened late last year. And as
- 22 Principal Deputy Garrett mentioned, those are also

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- 1 underway.
- 2 MS. KOOKESH: Can I ask one more
- 3 question?
- 4 MR. GALLEGOS: Certainly.
- 5 MS. KOOKESH: Can you give us a sense or
- 6 an overview of timing for implementing this policy
- 7 in the manual?
- 8 MR. GALLEGOS: So, this -- that's a good
- 9 question. Thank you. This is a priority for the
- 10 Secretary and Assistant Secretary. This is the
- 11 second consultation with Alaska Native
- 12 Corporations. The first one was yesterday, in
- 13 fact -- and so, after we receive all of the
- written feedback, after Monday, October 17th, this
- will be a priority to implement as soon as
- 16 possible. And again, we welcome all written input
- on these preliminary drafts by that date, Monday,
- October 17th. And please provide that to
- 19 consultation@bia.gov. Elizabeth?
- MS. HENSLEY: Yeah, thanks. Just wanted
- 21 to make sure you guys are aware that the annual
- 22 Alaska Federation of Natives convention will be

- 1 happening in person this year. It's been kind of
- 2 iffy. So, that week -- you know, over the last
- 3 couple of years -- so, that week of October 17th
- 4 is the gathering in Anchorage. And that's always
- 5 a time when Tribal Representatives, and ANSCA
- 6 representatives, and Elders, and youth, and
- 7 everybody get together. We call it Native New
- 8 Year. It's a holiday for us. But anyways,
- 9 there'll be all kinds of activities then. So, I'm
- 10 guessing it's probably already on your radar, but
- in case it isn't, now it is.
- MR. GALLEGOS: Thank you, Liz. I know
- 13 there's some other points in flux. And I don't
- 14 know if Tracy has any more points on that.
- MS. GOODLUCK: Not really, it is on our
- 16 radar. We're very aware of it in our hallway and
- 17 we're looking -- we're assessing at who, and if we
- 18 can send some form of the Indian Affairs hallway
- 19 to AFN. I've personally been there in the past
- 20 and love it. So, like I understand why you guys
- 21 call it your New Year. That's great that it's
- 22 back in person. Congratulations. I'm happy that

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folks can gather together safely. So, we are
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- 2 assessing if and who we can send someone to AFN.
- 3 MS. HENSLEY: Okay, fabulous. Yeah, I
- 4 remember you presenting Tracy, in Fairbanks some
- 5 years back that was -- I know people were really
- 6 glad to see you there. So, thanks. Glad it's on
- 7 your radar.
- 8 MR. GALLEGOS: And again, these drafts
- 9 of updates to the departmental manual, clarify
- 10 that this chapter applies to all department
- 11 bureaus and offices, identifying the
- 12 responsibilities of those bureaus and offices in
- 13 the consultation process, and establish and inks a
- 14 corporation consultation annual report for
- department bureaus and offices. We'll give it a
- 16 few more moments before providing a last call out.
- 17 Again, we welcome any written input that you may
- 18 have. Please provide that again, before Monday
- 19 October 17th.
- Hearing none, again, encourage you to
- 21 examine the 2012 DOI policy on consultation with
- 22 ANSCA Corporations as background. And that to

Τ	clarify that policy has been incorporated into the
2	drafts, policy and consultation and procedures for
3	consultation with ANSCA Corporations. We thank
4	you for your time today. And we look forward to
5	receiving your written input to
6	consultation@va.gov by 11:59 p.m., Alaska Time,
7	Monday, October 17th, 2022. At this time, this
8	concludes our consultation on the Alaska Native
9	Corporation Consultation Policy and Procedures.
