I have seen for myself the connection that the Tataviam have to the land and the many ways they give back to their community and the broader Los Angeles community.

The Fernandeño Tataviam Band of Mission Indians is recognized by the State of California as a sovereign Indian nation of 900 citizens but has not received the federal recognition that provides critical access to much-needed government funding to support their community. Federal acknowledgement is long overdue and is a necessary next step of repairing the wrongs of the past.
