





What is the Quechan Business Development Center?

The Quechan Business Development Center (QBDC) is a business incubator program in Winterhaven,
California, specifically designed to support Tribal Vendor, Merchant, and Entrepreneur (VME) businesses
on the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation. Launched in November 2023, it operates under the Fort Yuma Quechan
Indian Tribe's Economic Development Administration (EDA).

Target Audience:

- Enrolled Members of the Quechan Tribe.
- VME businesses that are located or aiming to operate on the Quechan Reservation.

Services:

- Business Incubation: Provides workspace, resources and support to help new Tribal businesses grow and prosper.
- Mentorship and Coaching: Connect Tribal entrepreneurs with experienced professionals for guidance and advice.
- Training and Workshops: Offers educational programs on various business topics like marketing, finance and legal compliance.
- Access to Capital: Assists Tribal businesses in securing funding through connections and resources
- Networking Opportunities: Facilitates connections with other Tribal entrepreneurs, potential investors and community partners.

IBIP Year One Funding: \$300,000 for building and site renovation, modern equipment, resources and professional business advisory services.



QBDC Existing Programs:

- **Business Incubator:** Launched in November 2023, this program offers office space, mentorship, coaching and workshops to enrolled Quechan Tribal members starting or growing their businesses.
- Partnership with Moonshot: This collaboration provides QBDC participants access to accounting, financial and legal advisory services.
- Partnership with Minority Business Development Agency (MBDA): Start a New Business Workshop: This ongoing informative event helps aspiring entrepreneurs with the basics of starting their own business.
- Partnership with Small Business Development Center (SBDC): Open No-Cost Business Counseling: This monthly onsite event provides access to a dedicated SBDC Business Counselor for confidential one-on-one counseling.



Understanding the complex challenges of the QBDC:

Native entrepreneurs on the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation face unique struggles and challenges, some shared with entrepreneurs everywhere and others specific to the Quechan Tribe community. Here are some key points to consider:

General Challenges:

- Access to capital
- Limited infrastructure
- Marketing and advertising
- Competition

Fort Yuma (Quechan) Challenges:

- Bureaucracy
- Limited business support
- Land ownership
- Historical trauma and its impact

Additional Factors:

- Lack of skilled workforce (Human capital)
- Cultural considerations



QBDC Impact Timeline:

Short-term (1-2 years):

- Establish a track record of successful business incubation.
- Secure additional funding.
- Develop strong relationships with community stakeholders.
- Refine the incubation program based on data and feedback.

Mid-term (3-5 years):

- Become a recognized leader in Tribal business incubation.
- Expand programs offerings to cater to diverse business needs.
- Attract and support high-growth ventures.
- Develop a sustainable funding model.

• Long-term (5+ years):

- Become a catalyst for economic development on the Fort Yuma Indian Reservation.
- Serve as a model for other Tribal communities.
- Advocate for policies that support Native American Entrepreneurship.






