## **Recent Developments in Funding and Environmental Compliance**

• To ensure that the Pacific Region is complying with recent Secretarial Orders and Executive Orders that outline the policy that the Bureau of Indian affairs is to be taking moving forward, we request that proposals, statements of work, resolutions, and similar documents submitted do not contain references to climate change. We are unable to approve projects that involve climate change related actions at present.



• The Tribal Climate Resilience awards, Bipartisan Infrastructure Law funds, and Inflation Reduction Act funding sources are all currently on pause. We don't have a date for when these funds will be unfrozen, but an announcement will be sent out to Tribes that are affected by these pauses as soon as we learn more information.

### Recent/Upcoming Listings to Threatened and Endangered (T&E) Species

- The most recent additions to the Threatened/Endangered Species list that occur, or have the potential to occur, in California are as follows:
  - North American Wolverine Federally Listed in 2023
  - o Foothill Yellow Legged Frog 4 Distinct Population Segments Listed in 2023

Our office has already been integrating avoidance and minimization measures for these species into relevant projects. Upcoming listings have been delayed across the board as a result of the administration change, though they are still expected to go through at some point. The following are anticipated upcoming listings:

- o Foothill Yellow Legged Frog Critical Habitat Proposed Designation
- NW/SW Pond Turtle Proposed Threatened
- Western Spadefoot Proposed Threatened
- CA Spotted Owl Proposed Threatened
- Monarch Butterfly Proposed Threatened

## Sherman Indian High School Career Education Program – Sherman Fire Academy

• On March 28, 2025, the Sherman Indian High School (SIHS) hosted a Public Safety Career Day with the support of Christopher Lorenz from the Pacific Regional Office's Branch of Justice Services. With Lorenz's support SIHS was able to receive the assistance of over 30 local, state, and federal agencies. This event encouraged collaboration between the next generation of students, agencies, and the school's Fire Academy and Law programs which provide many Indian students the necessary skills to graduate from SIHS with all of the skills necessary to be immediately hired by these agencies.
